She rushed as a sophomore and worked her way through school with two jobs - one as a lifeguard for Division of Campus Recreation and the other as the Director of Swimming for NYSP. Alicia even participated in the Walt Disney Summer Program as a life guard and instructor. Alicia's strong work ethic has taken her across the country and back in order to find her current place at the Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. ## Back in school, how did you get involved with the Walt Disney Summer Program?

I have also worked as a traveling perfusionist going to Des Moines and Chattanooga and a medical company clinical specialist in the western 13 states.
